The Michigan Emergency Department Improvement Collaborative (MEDIC)'s aim is to increase the number of HIV screenings in the emergency department (ED) to improve early detection and connection to treatment. This will be accomplished in partnership with the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) through educational series and quality improvement (QI) opportunities.

The CDC recommends that everyone between the ages of 13 and 64 get tested for HIV at least once as part of routine health care. The urgent nature of an ED setting offers a unique opportunity to reach a broad, and often underserved, population that may not otherwise engage in routine healthcare; including those at risk for HIV infection.
